Thanks to the Thurston County Food Bank, Evergreen provides food distribution twice a month to Olympia campus and the broader community. Evergreen's Basic Needs Navigator, Washington Campus Coalition for the Public Good (WACC) AmeriCorps members, volunteers and student workers staff the Basic Needs Center in CAB 135. Our satellite is an indoor shopping model with seasonal produce from the Evergreen Organic farm. Visits to this satellite are connected to the TCFB network.

With great sadness we pay tribute to the amazing 'Dreamer and Schemer' who developed the Gateways for Incarcerated Youth program.

"I gathered a group of Native students from the college, and I told them, "If you come along this time, you're going to have to make a commitment to keep on coming. We went out to Maple Lane for the first time, and the kids that were there at the meeting were Chicano and Native American. I told them, "I don't have a clue of what you guys want that I could possibly provide?" One of the boys said, "Why should we tell you what we want? People are always asking us what we want, and they never show up again." So, I made the commitment that I would be back, and we would be back, if they would tell us what they wanted."

Gateways is now working with the Evergreen Liberation Learning Network (ELEN) as of Fall 2023.
